Introduction

At Good Shepherd, our focus is to ensure the safety of all children whilst they are at school. Every child, no matter their age, beliefs, or background, receives care and support.

Our staff is dedicated to ensuring the safety of children. This commitment ensures that students feel secure at school and are not anxious or fearful about potential risks. School staff are trained to respond appropriately if children express feelings of being unsafe.



At Good Shepherd, every child has the right to feel safe. Bullying or any form of unsafe behaviour that could harm others will not be tolerated at our school.



Keeping Our Place Safe

Children, parents, and staff at Good Shepherd are all part of keeping a safe school environment. The school actively identifies potential safety hazards and fixes them. It is important for children to report any unsafe observations to a teacher, ensuring a secure school environment for everyone.

Adult Code of Conduct

Good Shepherd makes sure there is a Code of Conduct for our community, including, staff, teachers, volunteers and workers, that clearly tells them how they should behave, speak and work with children at school. The Good Shepherd Code of Conduct is available on the school website, and at the school front office. When people sign in at the front office, they are agreeing to follow the Good Shepherd Code of Conduct. Good Shepherd always checks if the people who want to work at our school are ready to work with children. The people who look after our volunteers and staff are the Deputy Principals. They make sure all adults who work at our school are safe and have done special training to work in a school.

Student Code of Conduct

We expect all students to follow our Student Code of Conduct. Students are expected to create and maintain a caring, safe school community and an orderly, positive learning environment. We are:

SAFE, SUPPORTIVE, LEARNERS

There are consequences for breaking this conduct, that focus on reflection, action and improvement.

Feeling Safe and Speaking Up

The Good Shepherd staff and teachers play a vital role in helping children understand their right to feel safe and secure. Children are encouraged to talk to a trusted adult if they ever feel unsafe during school hours. During playtime there are yard duty teachers available, who wear hi-vis vests, that can assist students as needed.

Evie Stevens, Therese Abraham, and Claudia Deanshaw are key leaders at the school who are ready to listen and take action when children voice their concerns.

We're All Different

At Good Shepherd, we believe that all children are unique, and teasing or bullying due to differences is not tolerated. The school provides support and care for every child.

 - Differing abilities


Let's show respect to all students at school and ensure everyone feels included!
